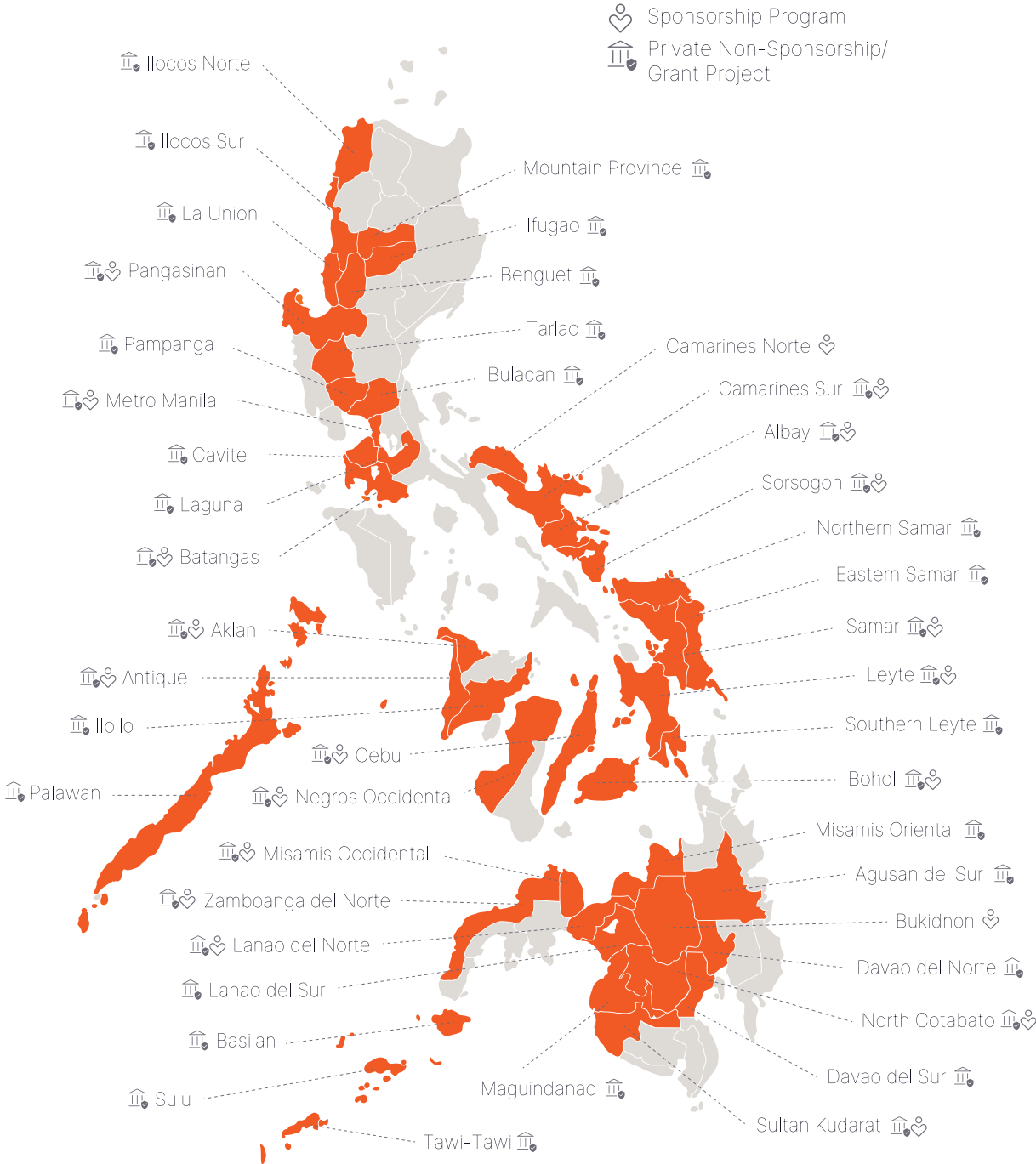

RIPPLE EFFECT

One child at the center. A lasting change in motion.

In a coastal community in Zamboanga del Norte, Princess Mae once carried the quiet worries familiar to many Filipino children: uncertainty about food, schooling, and the future.

Today, at 22, she stands as a youth leader and advocate, her voice shaped by years of support that helped her move from vulnerability to purpose.

Through World Vision's work, Princess did not only find opportunities for herself. She became part of a wider movement that strengthened her family and helped her community respond to shared challenges.

The year 2025 brought overlapping pressures for many children and families across the Philippines.

Poverty, health risks, climate-related disasters, and barriers to education and protection touched households in different ways, but their effects were deeply connected.

In Princess's journey, we see how change also travels in connection. Support for one child can extend to better nutrition practices at home, safer learning spaces in schools, and stronger systems that protect and uplift entire communities.



Starting with her journey, this report follows the ripples of that change.

From health and nutrition to education, child protection, livelihoods, disaster resilience, and advocacy, Princess's story reflects how focused investments in children create lasting impact beyond individual lives.

As she shares,

“Tinulungan ako ng World Vision na magkaroon ng pag-asa at makabangon. Pero hindi lang ako ang natulungan nila.”

(World Vision helped me find hope and rise again. But, I'm not the only one they helped...)



Her words echo the experience of many others: when a child is supported, hope spreads. Communities grow stronger.

Our promise of a fuller life for every child moves closer to reality.





RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN EDUCATION

Education is the key that unlocks a child's God-given potential, breaking the generational cycle of poverty. By uniting parents, schools, government and other partners, World Vision creates inclusive, culture-sensitive learning environments. We don't just put children in classrooms; we ensure they have the contextualized tools to achieve superior learning outcomes and build their own bright futures.

Unlocking Brighter Futures Across the Philippines

For Princess, being a World Vision sponsored child was the "blessing" that provided the economic and personal development she needed to reach college and find the hope to rise again.

Her journey serves as the lens for World Vision's broader mission to transform the educational sector, where every child—from aspiring professional athletes like 13-year-old Jomar Clint to eager young readers like Chris Darel—is given the tools to succeed.

This commitment is brought to life through strategic interventions like the "Brigada Pagbasa" remedial reading sessions in Manila supported by TELUS Digital, and the turnover of the "Kalinga Aralan" classroom in Batangas, a holistic safe space for learning and modern technology.

Furthermore, in Marawi and across Mindanao, the European Union-funded PEACE Mindanao Project highlights that education flourishes best in a culture of harmony; by empowering 85 young peacebuilders to exchange stories and ancestral traditions, World Vision ensures that schools are not just buildings, but sanctuaries of mutual respect.

Together, these initiatives prove that when conflict is replaced by collaboration, children gain the freedom to celebrate their childhood and pursue a future where no dream is unreachable.

RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN HEALTH AND NUTRITION

A child's formative years set the stage for a lifetime. To ensure children have the vitality to learn and play, we empower caregivers with essential knowledge in nutrition, hygiene, and feeding practices. Through strategic partnerships, we bridge the gap between vulnerable families and functional health facilities, making holistic wellness a reality for every household.

Rewriting the Story of Child Nutrition



In Bugallon, Pangasinan, a change is blooming as 79 children recently graduated from a 90-day ***Positive Deviance/Hearth (PD/Hearth)** nutrition class. These sessions serve as rehabilitation hubs where children reclaim their health through improved habits, contributing to the 228 malnourished children successfully rehabilitated this year.

This transformation extends to Mandaue City, where

Melany, a mother of four, struggled with the rising cost of food and an underweight toddler, Julie. Through World Vision's Urban Development Project, Melany's yard became a lush vegetable garden. With provided seeds and kits, her family now grows chemical-free food, and Julie has recovered through a specialized feeding program. This reflects a broader impact where 549 children attended feeding sessions and 12,085 accessed maternal and child health services.

Scaling these ripples of hope, a new partnership with Nature's Spring Foundation Inc. will expand PD/Hearth in Mandaue, focusing on sustainable behavior change. By equipping local health workers and reaching over 28,000 parents and children through home visits, World Vision ensures healthy habits take root.

From rural plains to urban neighborhoods, these simple acts of care are ushering Filipino children toward a life brimming with fullness.

**Positive Deviance/Hearth (PD/Hearth) is a community-based, food-based approach designed to tackle child malnutrition through local solutions and sustainable behaviour change.*

93.4% of infants (from 47.8% in 2021) receive critical newborn care within their first 6 weeks (**KOICA Maternal Neonatal and Child Health Project**)

66.2% of infants (from 54.4% in 2021) are now exclusively breastfed (**KOICA Maternal Neonatal and Child Health Project**)

99% of targeted healthcare personnel are fully trained in emergency obstetric, newborn care, and life support (**KOICA Maternal Neonatal and Child Health Project**)

RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN **WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH)**

Clean water is the lifeline of survival. Without it, a child's physical and mental growth is constantly under threat from preventable disease. World Vision, alongside our donors, transforms communities by constructing and rehabilitating critical water systems, ensuring that "potable and plenty" is the standard for every school and village.

Transforming Lives Through Clean Water and Sanitation

Twelve-year-old Keren cups her hands to catch the cold, running water from a school faucet—a simple act that was once an impossible dream. For years, students like her endured parched throats or missed lessons to walk long distances just to buy water.

Today, thanks to World Vision's Biosand Filtration System, Keren and 496 of her peers have a permanent source of safe water. This success is part of a year where 23,547 individuals gained access to clean water via 109 new community taps.

This ripple of change reaches even the remote marshlands of Mindanao, where 5,200 families now use specialized purifier packets to treat river water, while 21,382 people have been trained in life-saving hygiene practices.

Beyond water, World Vision restores dignity through sanitation. For mothers like Sharla, the H2OLIFE Project ended the struggle of sharing distant toilets, providing 158 households with private facilities.

This work proved vital after Severe Tropical Storm Trami, where World Vision and UNICEF helped survivors like 63-year-old Myrna rebuild destroyed latrines.

By ensuring 13,219 children now benefit from new handwashing and toilet facilities, World Vision is securing a future where health and privacy are guaranteed.

As Myrna says, a toilet is a daily necessity that restores a home's foundation, allowing children to stay healthy, focused, and hopeful.

RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN FAITH, DEVELOPMENT AND MENTAL HEALTH

Values are caught, not just taught. We believe a nurturing home is the foundation of a child's spirit. By promoting positive, faith-based parenting and child-focused peacebuilding activities, we raise a generation of empathetic leaders who are resilient in mind and grounded in collaborative values.

Healing Homes and Awakened Hope



For 34-year-old Glaiza in Camarines Sur, a simple drawing of a sari-sari store became the blueprint for a family miracle. Separated from her husband who works as a construction carrier in Manila, the mother of two carried the heavy burden of keeping her family's hopes alive. Everything shifted when she attended World Vision's ***Celebrating Families** seminar, an initiative under the Faith, Development, and Mental Health sector designed to nurture spiritual journeys and heal family dynamics.

Beyond miraculously opening her store through dedicated prayer and savings, Glaiza found something much deeper: a restored home. The workshop taught her how to communicate better across the miles with her husband and gently guide her children. This spiritual awakening rippled down to her 10-year-old son, who now regularly reads his favorite Bible stories, learning that faith conquers giants.

This quiet transformation is echoing across the Philippines. In Cebu, 59-year-old Romeo experienced a similar breakthrough through the same program. By reflecting on his own childhood, he is learning to break generational cycles and create a safer, more loving environment. By bridging spiritual nurture with emotional well-being, World Vision is successfully repairing fractured homes, proving that no matter the distance or age, the strongest families are built on a foundation of faith.

**Celebrating Families is a biblically based positive parenting program that equips parents and caregivers to nurture children's spiritual, emotional, and physical growth, helping them thrive in all aspects of life.*

RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN **CHILD PROTECTION AND PARTICIPATION**

Safety is a non-negotiable right. World Vision stands at the frontlines against abuse and exploitation by strengthening the systems meant to protect the vulnerable. More importantly, we place the power back in the hands of the youth. We equip them with the knowledge of their rights and the reporting mechanisms needed to secure their own safety.

Building Safer Paths for Every Child

In the mountains of Bukidnon, children used to cross a slippery bamboo bridge every day just to get to school. It was dangerous, especially when it rained. But today, the community is celebrating a new, sturdy steel footbridge provided by World Vision.

“We are so grateful,” says 19-year-old Alexa Mae. “From a bamboo bridge, now, a sturdy steel footbridge, a transformation we have long hoped for.” This bridge keeps children and families safe from falling and makes it much easier for parents to bring their goods to the market.

This care for children’s safety also protects their dreams. In her community, 15-year-old Lydel has grown from a child facing poverty into a strong football player and youth leader. She now inspires other girls to stay in school. Meanwhile, 6-year-old Maxhine receives the school supplies and milk she needs because her family joined a community savings group that helps them prepare for the future.

Protection also reaches the online world. In Benguet, 14-year-old Jochebed is learning how to stay safe while using the internet. When she saw something bad on social media, she knew exactly how to report it to keep herself and her friends safe from harm.

Whether it is a strong bridge over a river or a shield against online dangers, World Vision is working to make sure children can lead and grow without fear. By keeping them safe and giving them a voice, we are building a future full of hope for every child.

RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN FOOD SECURITY, LIVELIHOOD AND SOCIAL PROTECTION

Financial stability at home is the strongest shield for a child. We guide families toward economic independence by mastering savings and credit systems while opening doors to diverse, alternative income streams. When a family's pockets are full, a child's basic needs are never in question.

From Stitched Dreams to Harvested Hopes



A gentle breeze carries the sound of clucking chickens as 15-year-old Diona feeds her family's flock. For years, her parents worked the soil as farmers, living frugally and borrowing money just to keep their nine children in school. Today, that cycle of debt is broken.

Through World Vision's livelihood programs, Diona's family now manages a native chicken farm and a natural vegetable garden. These interventions provide daily meals and a steady income, allowing

Diona to excel in a science high school with dreams of becoming a doctor.

This ripple of hope extends far beyond the farm. Across the country, World Vision is strengthening food security and social protection by unlocking "hidden talents." In one community, fifteen mothers are stitching together a life of dignity by weaving malongs and mastering financial management. "It turns out it is possible for a parent to do more and explore her potential," shared one mother with pride.

In Camarines Sur, Jenelyn, a brave single mother, turned hair care training and a small grant into a thriving business to support her daughters after her husband's passing.

Through the "Empowerment through Entrepreneurship" program and partnerships with firms like Wells Fargo, hundreds of small entrepreneurs are gaining the coaching needed to thrive. Whether it is through fresh eggs on a table, a sewing machine, or a salon kit, World Vision is fostering self-reliance. Families are no longer just surviving; they are building a foundation where parents can provide, and children like Diona can finally dream big.

RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN **DISASTER RISK REDUCTION AND CLIMATE ACTION**

Disasters can erase years of progress in an instant. To prevent emergencies from derailing a child's education or safety, we equip communities with the tools and systems for climate adaptation. Whether it is proactive preparedness or rapid on-the-ground recovery, we ensure that resilience is built into the very fabric of the neighborhood.

Weaving a Tapestry of Resilience for Every Child

At the heart of the National Museum, the "Katumbalikwasan" exhibit stands as a vibrant testament to Filipino resilience. Meaning "resilience in the face of climate change," this showcase centers on children like 17-year-old Lady Lyn, who is transforming her community through ecological stewardship. Through World Vision's interventions, children are no longer just observers of the climate crisis; they are active architects of solutions, moving from awareness to tangible action.

This spirit of stewardship echoes in Kidapawan City through Project WISE. Here, a circular economy breathes life into sustainability as children as young as four learn the value of waste segregation. This initiative has not only turned plastic into eco-bricks but has restored dignity to waste collectors like Rodol, whose income has quadrupled through modernized support.

The journey toward safety continues in the bustling streets of Quezon City, where fire survivor Jasmin Maestre transforms her past tragedy into a community-led mission for preparedness. By crafting local hazard maps and disaster plans, she and her neighbors are striving for a "zero-casualty" future.

Whether it is turning waste into wealth in the south or fortifying urban neighborhoods in the north, World Vision's achievements in disaster risk reduction prove that resilience is built through collective heart. By empowering the most vulnerable, fear is replaced by a fortified hope, ensuring the next generation inherits a world where they are not just survivors, but guardians of a thriving planet.

By refining our own organizational systems and guidelines, World Vision ensures that no child is left in the shadows of the ripple.

Creating A Future Where Everyone Belongs



For Genita, a 49-year-old widow in Zamboanga del Norte, every day is a quiet act of heroism. To send her 10-year-old daughter, Angel—who faces challenges in speaking and movement—to school, Genita painstakingly balances her seasonal income from charcoal selling and farming. Despite the expensive commute and the physical distance from the community center, she refuses to let Angel's dream of becoming a teacher fade.

In late 2024, coinciding with the International Day of Persons with Disabilities, World Vision's disability inclusion initiatives brought a transformative light to their journey. By launching digital inclusive learning materials and the "Learning Passport," the organization bridged the gap between home and the classroom. This approach empowers parents like Genita to become active partners in their children's development, ensuring that education is accessible for all.

World Vision's achievements in the GEDSI sector extend beyond materials; they are rebuilding community foundations. By equipping schools with modern tools, conducting workshops on Filipino Sign Language, and mobilizing local stakeholders, the program is dismantling the stigma surrounding disability.

These interventions prove that when a community is equipped with the right tools and a heart for inclusion, barriers move and hope takes root. For Angel and many others, the path to a brighter future is no longer a lonely walk, but a collective stride toward a world where every child truly belongs.

RIPPLES OF CHANGE IN **ADVOCACY**

The threats facing children today are constantly shifting, and our response must be just as dynamic. By amplifying the voices of children and youth, we influence the national policies that govern their lives.

Shaping a Safer Philippines for Every Child



For a child in a vulnerable community, “policy” can feel like an invisible concept. Yet, at World Vision, it is the very shield that protects their dreams. We believe advocacy is justice in motion—a commitment to changing the systems and attitudes that stand in a child’s way.

This past year, that commitment bore remarkable fruit. By working hand-in-hand with communities through our ***Citizen Voice and Action** approach, we ensured that the lived experiences of children reached the halls of power. These efforts contributed to over 100 local and national policies, strengthening the safety nets for more than 6 million children across the Philippines.

The battle for safety also moved to the digital frontier. In 2025, World Vision contributed to the development of the country’s first National Strategic Plan Against Online Sexual Abuse or Exploitation of Children (OSAEC) and Child Sexual Abuse or Exploitation Materials (CSAEM), and was later identified as co-lead for Key Result Area 4 on Partnerships and Networking. We are now standing at the forefront of a coordinated national response to protect children from online exploitation, ensuring the internet remains a space for learning, not fear.

However, protection requires more than words; it requires resources. Through the Alternative Budget Initiative, we successfully championed budget proposals in the Senate and House of Representatives to fund Women and Child Protection Units.

We aren’t just rewriting laws; we are rewriting futures. Every policy passed and every peso secured is a heartbeat of hope, proving that when we raise our voices together, we create a world where every child is cared for, protected, and free.

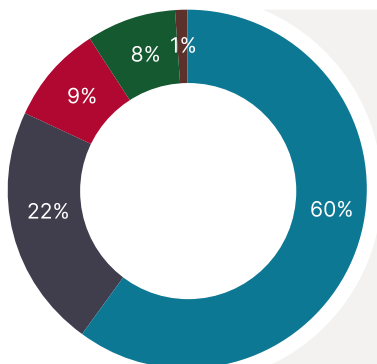

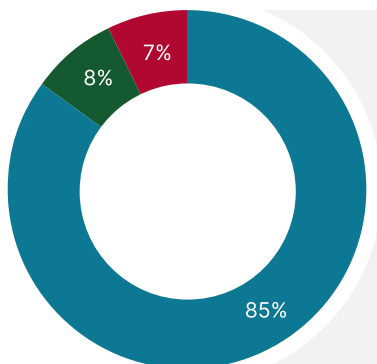
Where Our **FUNDS** Come From



Revenue Sources (PHP 996 M)

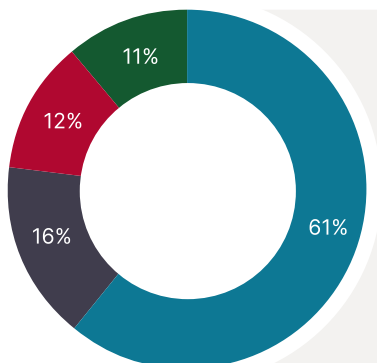
